

These keyboards fold up into the size of a Palm Pilot, yet expanded to nearly full size. All of a sudden, my dimmer switch went to full and the light bulb over my head final turned on. All these PDA devices weren't there just for me to track appointments and contact information, but to replace the laptop that I thought

weighed next to nothing until I had to carry it from one side of O'Hare airport to the other.

PDAs are not out to replace my paper appointment book, but to replace my laptop. PDAs are smaller and lighter then any laptop and when you combine the cost of the various options they're also cheaper.


